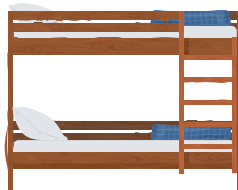

Pronouns

Pronouns take the place of nouns in a sentence.

A **personal pronoun** is a word we can use instead of a person, place, or thing.

We use them instead of repeating the noun.

Instead of saying: I share a bedroom with my sister. My sister is very messy.

We can say: I share a bedroom with my sister. **She** is very messy.

We use these pronouns to replace the subject of a sentence:

Singular: I, you, he, she, it

Plural: we, they

- **I** went to the shops this morning.
- **You** watched TV last night.
- **They** played football on the weekend.

We use these pronouns to replace the object of a sentence:

Singular: me, him, her, it

Plural: us, them

- Tom wrote a letter to **me**.
- The dog went for a walk with **them**.
- She is my friend. I like **her** a lot.

Grammar II

Possessive pronouns

Possessive pronouns are used to show someone owns something.

my, our, your, his, her, its, their

- That is **my** bag.
- Are they **your** shoes?
- This is **our** home

Like personal pronouns they are also used instead of nouns.

- Tom forgot where he put **Tom's** bag.

Instead of **Tom's** we use **his**.

- Tom forgot where he put **his** bag.

We do not use apostrophes with possessive pronouns.

We can also use possessive pronouns without an object.

mine, ours, yours, his, hers, its, and theirs

- There are lots of coats here. Which one is **yours**?
- The flat on the top floor is **theirs**.
- Don't take that cake! It's **mine**!
